#### **Overuse of adverbs**

**Incorrect:** The boy ran really fast to catch the runaway ball.

**Correct:** The boy sprinted to catch the runaway ball.

**Too many prepositional phrases** 

**Incorrect:** The caravan came over the top of the hill.

Correct: The caravan crested the hill.



# Ambiguous ("Squinting") modifiers

**Incorrect:** Listening to loud music slowly gives me a headache.

**Correct:** When I listen to loud music, I slowly develop a headache.

#### Misuse of lie/lay

**Incorrect:** He was laying on the couch.

**Correct:** He was lying on the couch.



### **Ambiguous pronoun references**

Incorrect: John had a card for Helga, but couldn't deliver it because he was in her way.

Correct: John had a card for Helga, but couldn't deliver it because Tim was in Helga's way.

#### **Wrong Word**

**Incorrect:** Did you catch my illusion to the Bible?

**Correct:** Did you catch my allusion to the Bible?



#### **Run-on sentences**

**Incorrect:** Lila enjoyed the bouquet of tulips John gave her on prom night however she prefers roses.

**Correct:** Lila enjoyed the bouquet of tulips John gave her on prom night; however, she prefers roses.

#### **Wordiness (inflated sentences)**

**Incorrect:** It has come to our attention that your tax returns are overdue and we urge you to file them at your earliest convenience.

Correct: Your tax returns are overdue. Please file them now.



Using "could of" instead of "could have"

**Incorrect:** Sam could of received an A on his essay, but he made too many grammatical mistakes.

**Correct:** Sam could have received an A on his essay, but he made too many grammatical mistakes.

### **Tautologies**

Incorrect: Jack made a water pail with his own hands for Jill.

Correct: Jack made a water pail for Jill.



#### **Comma splices**

**Incorrect:** He was very hungry, he ate a whole pizza.

**Correct:** He was very hungry. He ate a whole pizza.

**Correct:** He was very hungry, so he ate a whole pizza.

# **Missing Comma with a Nonrestrictive Element**

Incorrect: David who loved to read history was the first to head to the British Library.

Correct: David, who loved to read history, was the first to head to the British Library.



#### Missing Comma in a Compound Sentence

A compound sentence consists of two or more independent clauses. When the clauses are joined by a coordinating conjunction (for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so), use a comma before the conjunction to indicate a pause between the two thoughts.

**Incorrect:** Miranda drove her brother and her mother waited at home.

Correct: Miranda drove her brother, and her mother waited at home.

### **Unnecessary Shift in Verb Tense**

Verbs that shift from one tense to another with no clear reason can confuse readers.

**Example:** Martin searched for a great horned owl. He takes photographs of all the birds he sights.



#### **Check your spelling!**

Even though technology now reviews much of our spelling for us, one of the top 20 most common errors is a spelling error. That's because spell checkers cannot identify many misspellings, and are most likely to miss homonyms (e.g., presence/presents), compound words incorrectly spelled as separate words, and proper nouns, particularly names. After you run the spell checker, proofread carefully for errors such as these:

Vladmir Putin is the controversial leader of Russia.

Every where she walked, she was reminded of him.
